In addition, Mathematics now comprises of two GCSEs for the majority of students. Science will be two GCSEs for most and Triple Science is offered as one of the option choices.

The option form makes it clear how many choices should be selected, how to prioritise choices and when the form should be returned.

General Information

General Certificate of Secondary Education (GCSE)

GCSEs are available in a large number of subjects. They are part of a single system of examinations which are graded using a scale of A*, A, B, C, D, E, F and G in Wales.

In some subjects, grades do not only depend on a final examination. You will also complete coursework in school and/or at home, which counts towards the final GCSE grade. Double Award GCSEs count as two GCSEs each. In some subjects you are entered for GCSE at Foundation, Intermediate or Higher Level, depending upon your ability. Decisions about which level is appropriate are made with you during the course. In Wales, all GCSEs are provided by WJEC.

Business and Technology Education Council (BTEC)

In years 10 and 11 we offer vocational level 2 qualifications equivalent to a GCSE. It is possible to study some subjects as a BTEC rather than a GCSE. BTEC courses are more vocational and they have the following GCSE equivalents:

- BTEC Level 1 qualifications are equivalent to a GCSE pass
- BTEC Level 2 qualifications are equivalent to one GCSE grade A* C
- BTEC Level 2 extended qualifications are equivalent to two GCSE grades A* C

Core Subjects

The following subjects are compulsory at Key Stage 4:

- Mathematics (two GCSEs: Mathematics and Mathematics Numeracy)
- English (two GCSEs: English Language and English Literature)
- Science (Double Award)
- Welsh (First Language or Second Language, as applicable)
- Physical Education
- Religious Education
- Equality and Diversity
- Welsh Baccalaureate (WBQ)

To optimise your opportunities in further and higher education and in the world of work, it is imperative that you have a thorough understanding of numeracy and literacy. As Welsh citizens, all pupils are required to study Welsh, WBQ, RE and PE. These enable you to fully participate in all aspects of life and greatly increase your chances of securing employment.

English Language

Course: GCSE

Assessment: 80% Examination

The Course:

The GCSE English Language course will enable you to become excellent communicators of both the spoken and written word. You will learn to speak and write confidently, effectively, precisely and appropriately. You will understand the conventions of oral and written language and will be able to select and adapt your speech and writing to different situations, purposes and audiences.

You will be able to understand the meaning of a wide range of texts and will study the patterns, structures and conventions of language. You will learn other vital life skills such as verbal reasoning and develop your ability to think constructively and critically which are vital in our society and the world of work.

Assessment:

This course is assessed in three separate units.

Unit 1: Coursework (20%). Individual researched presentation and a group discussion.

Unit 2: 2 hour examination (40%). Description, narration and exposition.

Unit 3: 2 hour examination (40%). Argument, persuasion and instruction

English Literature

Course: GCSE

The Course:

Assessment:

The GCSE English Literature course will allow you to make informed personal responses to a rich tapestry of literature.

You will study a range of poetry, prose and drama, including Shakespeare. The study of literature will greatly enhance your reading and writing skills too. You will develop an understanding of the ways in which literature has been richly influential over time and in the present day.

You will explore how texts from other cultures and traditions may reflect or influence values and thoughts. You will learn how to make connections between ideas, themes and issues and you will become critical readers of fiction and non-fiction prose, poetry and drama. Importantly, you will also explore traditional poetry from Welsh writers and explore how themes and ideas are presented.

Consult your teachers to identify the specific texts required for your Year 10 studies and consider purchasing them. Seek guidance from your teachers if you're uncertain about where to obtain these materials. Additionally, you are encouraged in Year 9 to buy a copy of 'Of Mice and Men.' Please reach out to your teachers for further advice on recommended literature.

Unit 1: 2 hour examination (35%). Prose and Poetry.

Unit 2: 2 hour examination (40%). Drama and Prose.

Unit 3: Coursework (25%). Shakespeare and Poetry

Equality and Diversity

Course: NCFE

Assessment: 100% coursework

The Course:

You will consider what equality and diversity are and what they look like in society. We use real-life examples and case studies including religion, culture and politics. Students will come to understand what is meant by prejudice, labelling, stereotyping, as well as what makes us who we are.

Students will go on to consider the diversity in their own communities and how this enriches society. They will also go on to look at UK law and policies and how these work to ensure equality and diversity in society and in the workplace.

Assessments:

The course is split into three units. Unit 1 is completed in year 10 and Unit 2 and 3 in year 11.

Unit 1: Equality and diversity in society. Religious, cultural and political views.

Unit 2: Equality and diversity in the community. Case studies.

Unit 3: Equality and diversity in the workplace. Religious, legal and cultural views.

Mathematics & Mathematics Numeracy

Course: GCSE

Assessment: 100% Examination

The Course:

Over years 10 and 11, you will prepare for two Mathematics GCSEs.

Mathematics Numeracy

This covers the mathematics that you will use day to day and in the world of work. For example, calculating the cost of household bills, the weight of ingredients in a recipe, exchange rates, converting between miles and kilometres and speed and time problems. You will sit the Numeracy examinations in November of year 11.

Mathematics

This develops the skills from the levels of mathematics you worked on during KS3. You will focus on the four main areas of mathematics: Number, Algebra, Shape and Measure, Statistics and Probability. You will sit the Mathematics examinations in the summer of year 11.

There are three tiers of entry for both examinations.

Higher Tier: Grades A* - C

Intermediate Tier: Grades B - E

Foundation Tier: Grades D - G

Assessment:

You will sit the Numeracy GCSE in November of year 11.

You will sit the Mathematics GCSE in the Summer of year 11.

There will be two units (papers) for each GCSE. You must sit both:

Unit 1: Non-calculator paper (50%)

Unit 2: Calculator paper (50%)

Science (Double)

Course: GCSE

10% Practical

The Course:

Highly regarded, the double science award allows students to follow onto science A-level courses and careers in the science industry such as veterinary studies, engineering, medicine, forensic science and nursing, to name but a few.

The National Curriculum dictates that all students undertake a balanced course of study of the sciences at GCSE level. Every student will be expected to achieve at least two science GCSEs by the end of year 11.

Assessment:

You will study biology, chemistry and physics with subject specialist teachers and be examined on each at the end of years 10 and 11. In addition, you will be expected to carry out practical tasks in lessons and to complete a practical assessment worth 10% of your final grade.

Welsh First Language

The Course:

Studying the GCSE Welsh First Language course will encourage you to develop your confidence when communicating effectively in Welsh and to develop skills to make practical use of the language. Together these skills will allow you to communicate effectively, usefully and appropriately in our bilingual society. This course is open to those who have studied Welsh as a first language throughout Key Stage 3. There are three units of study spread across years 10 and 11.

Assessment:

Unit 1: Oracy (30%). Individual Researched Presentation (15%). Responding and Interacting (15%).

Unit 2: Exam (35%). Reading and Writing: Description, Narration and Exposition.

Unit 3: Exam (35%). Reading and Writing: Argument, Persuasion and Instruction

Welsh Second Language

Course: GCSE

The Course:

Studying the GCSE Welsh Second Language Course will encourage you to develop your confidence when communicating effectively in Welsh. You will develop skills to make practical use of the language in order to communicate effectively, usefully and appropriately in a bilingual society.

Over the course of years 10 and 11, you will study four units, one in year 10 and three in year 11. The themes are Employment, Wales and the World and Youth.

Assessment:

Year 10:

Unit 1: 25% Speaking - Spoken response to visual material.

Year 11:

- Unit 2: 25% Speaking Communicating with others.
- Unit 3: 25% Reading and Writing examination Narrative, specific and instructional.
- Unit 4: 25% Reading and Writing examination. Descriptive, creative and imaginative

National/Foundation Skills Challenge Certificate Course:

The Course:

The Skills Challenge Certificate is a compulsory qualification. The central focus of the Welsh Baccalaureate is to provide a vehicle for 14-16 year olds to develop and consolidate essential and employability skills. You will be taught through two hours of lessons per week in year 10 and one hour per week in year 11, working both individually and as part of a team.

Assessment:

The qualification comprises of three components, each assessed on a pass, merit or distinction basis through portfolio work. You will be taught through a variety of activities aimed to help you to develop a range of transferable skills such as literacy, numeracy, digital literacy, critical thinking & problem solving, planning & organisation, creativity & innovation and personal effectiveness.

These will be assessed through the completion of three challenges:

- 1. Individual Project (50%). Personal research you will set your own research question, gather data and information about the topic, analyse your research and draw conclusions to answer your question. The topic should relate to your future career and study interests.
- 2. Enterprise and Employability Challenge (25%). Demonstrate creativity and innovation in designing a new product or service that would make a successful enterprise. You will work in a team with specific roles and tasks and then pitch your idea to a panel of business experts.
- 3. Global Citizenship Challenge (25%). Learn how to assess sources of information for their credibility and usefulness. You will investigate a current issue and demonstrate your creativity in raising awareness about it. You could write a song, poem, children's book or a leaflet.

The information below is very important, so make sure you read everything carefully. Always remember when choosing subjects:

- Choose the subjects you like the most and the ones you are best at.
- Choose subjects you need to study if you have a particular career in mind.
- Do not choose a subject because your friend is choosing it, as you might not be in the same teaching group and what is the right choice for your friend may not be the right one for you.
- Do not choose a subject just because you like the teacher, as you may not have the same teacher next year.

Make sure you're clued up!

You need to know as much as possible about courses on offer and to think carefully about how you would cope with them. A lot of people can help with information and advice. Think carefully about what you want to know and make sure that you ask.

Who can help me?

The Careers Wales School Advisor will be able to give you advice about jobs. You can visit their website www.careerswales.com for more information. You also have a Year Mentor and Head of Year who will also help you to make your choices and answer questions you may have. Don't forget it is also important to discuss this booklet with your parents and make your choices together. Your subject teachers can tell you about the subject, how well you might do in their subject and also about careers linked to it. The names of teachers to contact for the different subjects are given in each subject section.

How do we allocate the options?

When all the information on the option form is collected together, we check to see how many students want to follow the courses that are offered. If not enough students have chosen a course, it may not be possible to run it. Sometimes a course is oversubscribed and too many students want to do it, so there are not enough places available. If this happens, we check other subject choices and try to offer students these choices instead which is why we ask for extra choices from everyone. No changes are made without talking to the students concerned.

Can I change my mind?

Once we have started the process, it is hard to accommodate a change of mind. It is very important therefore to find out as much as possible before choosing your subjects to ensure that you make your option choices carefully

Art & Design D

Course: GCSE

Assessment: 60% Coursework

40% Externally set assignment

The Course:

Throughout the course, you will develop ideas through observation and understanding the work of other artists, whilst investigating the media tools and techniques used by the artists and applying them to your work. You will explore a variety of media, tools and techniques to express your ideas, create numerous compositions based upon research, experimentation and scaling up, alongside digital manipulation of images based on your own work.

Great value is placed on independent thinking, and you are encouraged to explore, investigate and choose a specific theme of your choice for your final composition. For this, you can create a large-scale final piece in mixed and multi-media, which will also involve you working in 2D, 3D and digitally. Photography is also an area you will explore within Art & Design alongside other media, in which you will gain a range of experiences in digital photography, digital image manipulation and creation of digital artworks.

Areas of study can include: • Drawing • Printing • Painting • Sculpture • Installation • Photography • Digital Art • Mixed media • Land art • Graphic communication • Textile design • Three-dimensional design and more. Students may explore overlapping areas and/or combinations of disciplines and can include more than one area of study. Assessment:

The course is assessed in two units - coursework and an externally set assignment.

Unit 1: Coursework Portfolio based on themes or a subject you have chosen.

Unit 2: An externally set assignment which will be presented to you as an examination paper. You will be given approximately six weeks preparation time and 10 hours to complete a piece of focused study.

The four Assessment Objectives below assess the qualities of analytical understanding, practical experimentation, researching and individual expression required at GCSE level.

Business

GCSE Course:

The Course:

You will study the purpose of different types of business and the need for enterprise, planning and organisation. You will learn about different types of ownership of a business and why a particular location can be crucial to its success. Learning about outside influences such as law, technology, environment and globalisation will increase your understanding of how an organisation makes decisions.

The course looks at specialist functions, starting with operations where we will explore production methods and quality products, supply chains and services.

By studying finance, you will combine learning about where funds come from to start and run a business with how success can be measured by the money that a business makes. You will explore new terminology - sales, profit and loss, break-even, profit margins. Using case studies, you will advise on how a business can manage its finances without compromising on quality, ethics and service.

The marketing unit will help you to understand how to create a need for a product. By exploring the techniques used to gather information about what we like and learning how it is used to create demand, you will learn how to use your own money in the future.

The final unit explores human resources. Learn how people are key to an organisation's success, recruitment processes, different structures and management styles and how a business can motivate employees.

Lessons will use real businesses as examples where possible to help you to understand the new concepts you will come across. Visits to businesses and guests coming into some lessons will help you to learn in different ways.

Unit 1: Written exam (62.5%). A mix of short answer and structured questions based on stimulus material covering all of the specification content.

Creative Media Production



Course: BTEC (Edexcel)

Assessment: 100% Coursework

The Course:

This course is divided into three units:

1. Exploring Media Products

Developing your understanding of how media products create meaning for their audiences.

2. Developing Digital Media production skills

Developing skills and techniques in media production processes by reworking media products from one, or all, of the following sectors: audio/moving image, publishing, interactive design.

3. Create a Media Product in response to a brief

Applying and developing your planning and production skills and techniques to create a media product in response to a client brief. This will involve the understanding, planning, producing and evaluating of a product for a specific brief and client.

Assessment:

You will be assessed through a series of projects which will be produced in a variety of electronic forms.

Units 1 & 2 will be internally assessed and Unit 3 will be externally assessed.

Digital Technology



Course: WJEC GCSE in Digital Technology

Assessment: 40% The Digital World (On-Screen examination)

40% Digital Practices (Non-Exam Assessed)

20% Communicating in the digital world (Non-Exam Assessed)

The Course:

This relatively new and exciting Digital Technology qualification allows you to build on your digital skills, knowledge and understanding that is seen and used in everyday lives.

The qualification will allow you to develop your understanding of the range of digital technology systems that are used in our connected and globalised society. It will also allow you to explore the ever-evolving nature of digital technology systems and how these systems can be used productively, creatively and safely.

Assessment:

Unit 1: This on-screen assessment comprises of a range of question types related to digital technology systems, the value of digital technology and perspectives on digital technology.

Unit 2: There are two sections to this unit. Section A will require the interrogation of supplied data into a spreadsheet that links to section B where a website will be made incorporating an animation that you create related to a set context.

Unit 3: This unit focusses on marketing digital assets using social media. You will create digital assets related to a set context and then create an online digital communications campaign.

Film Studies D

Course: GCSE

The Course:

You will develop knowledge and understanding of a range of different films from the following categories:

- US film
- Independent film
- Global film
- Key developments in film and technology

The practical element of the course will provide you with the opportunity to create your own short film, making use of the camera and editing equipment we have at school.

In addition, Film Studies offers an abundance of unique experiences to develop skills within filmmaking, offering opportunities to become part of the cast and crew on locally produced short films. For example, this year, after winning a script writing competition, our students worked with the IRIS Prize to make a short film which was premiered in Cineworld as part of the IRIS Film Festival.

Geography D

Course: GCSE

The Course:

GSCE Geography adopts an enquiry approach to the study of geographical information, issues and concepts. The course content is organised around two units, the first on changing physical and human landscapes and the second on environmental and developmental issues.

Fieldwork is an essential aspect of geographical education. It is placed at the heart of this course and students will consolidate and extend their understanding of classroom concepts by engaging with enquiries conducted outside of the classroom and school grounds.

The enquiry approach taken by GCSE Geography in both classroom and fieldwork contexts will enable students to develop the ability to think "like a geographer". There will be opportunities to:

- Think creatively by asking questions that relate to geographical processes and concepts.
- Think scientifically by collecting and recording appropriate evidence from a range of sources, including fieldwork, before critically assessing the validity of evidence and combining findings to reach evidenced conclusions.
- Think independently by applying geographical knowledge, understanding, skills and approaches appropriately and creatively to real world contexts.

GCSE Geography develops and extends a student's knowledge of locations, places, environments and processes, at a range of different scales.

Unit 1: Written exam: Changing physical and human landscapes

Unit 2: Written exam: Environmental and developmental issues

Unit 3: Coursework: Controlled assessment

Hair & Beauty



Course: Level 2 Certificate in Hair services

Assessment: 100% Coursework

The Course:

This course is a combination of written assignments which build up to an individual portfolio of evidence and practical assessments. These are prepared through extended practical time, working on other students' and model heads. You will develop a wide range of industry standard skills and approaches and, at the same time, you can be creative with your own designs!

Assessments:

Unit 1: Working in the hair & beauty industry

Unit 2: Follow health & safety in the salon

Unit 3: Client consultation for hair & beauty services

Unit 4: Shampoo & condition hair & scalp

Unit 5: The art of dressing hair

Unit 6: Plaiting & twisting hair

Unit 7: Creating a total look

There are also opportunities for students to develop skills in manicure and photography make up sessions. This qualification provides a broad background of understanding of the hair and beauty industry. It also provides an awareness of the range of jobs available so you can make informed decisions about careers in this sector.

Health and Social and Childcare

Course: GCSE Single Award

The Course:

In Year 10, students will complete unit 1. This covers topics on:

- Human growth and development across all different life stages.
- · Physical, social, emotional and intellectual health.
- The importance of active participation on development and well-being
- Early intervention and prevention to promote and support growth, development and well-being for a range of conditions and circumstances.

In year 11, students will complete two different sets of coursework in Unit 2:

- Health and social care, and childcare provision in Wales to promote and support health and well-being
- Public health and health promotion across the life cycle
- Factors affecting health and well-being across the life cycle

Assessments:

Coursework (Unit 2 topics in Year 11) & examination (Unit 1 topics in Y10)

It is very important to stress that this course covers issues that affect individuals of all ages, and not just infants and children.

History



Course: GCSE

Assessment: 80% exam

20% coursework

The Course:

You will acquire an understanding of different identities, including your own, within a society and an appreciation of social, cultural, religious and ethnic diversity whilst building on your understanding of the past and the diversity of human experience through experiencing a broad and balanced course of study.

You will also acquire an understanding of the nature of historical study, for example, that history is concerned with judgements based on available evidence and that some historical judgements may be more valid than others. Throughout the course, you will be examining continuity, change, cause and consequence, significance and similarity over different periods of time - short, medium and long term.

This course will enable you to develop your interest and enthusiasm for History and to build a further understanding of its intrinsic value and significance. You will be able to expand your knowledge and understanding of specific historical events and to examine different periods in different societies.

You will learn about how to organise and communicate your historical knowledge and understanding in different ways, arguing a case and reaching substantiated judgements. This GCSE course will allow you to become effective, independent and resilient learners and help you to develop into critical and reflective thinkers through the process of historical enquiry.

Assessment:

Unit 1: Written exam. A study in depth of "Depression, War and Recovery 1930-1951".

Unit 2: Written exam. A study in depth of "Germany in Transition 1919-1939".

Unit 3: Written exam. A thematic study on "Crime and Punishment from 1500 to the present day".

Coursework: You will also complete two pieces of coursework

History: Ancient History



Course: GCSE (OCR)
Contact: Mr D Jolliffe
Assessment: 100% exam

The Course:

The course will allow you to develop your understanding of the ancient world and the legacy of the ancient world in today's society. It uses a range of ancient source material, both literary, visual and archaeological to develop your understanding and knowledge of the ancient world.

The course focuses on aspects of both Roman and Greek history with a period and a depth study for each with no coursework requirement. Both areas explore aspects of the military, political, religious, social and cultural history of their respective cultures.

The Greek half of the course comprises of a period study of the Persian Empire 559-465 looking at the rise of the Persian Empire, its development and interaction with the Greek nations, including the Battle of Thermopylae vs 300 Spartans and the Sack of Athens. The depth study develops understanding of the life of Alexander the Great, studying his youth, conquests, campaigns, significant events of his life and his army and military tactics.

The Roman aspect of the course comprises of a period study of the Foundations of Rome 754-440BC developing the foundation and origin stories of Rome, its' development by the Etruscan Kings and the formation of the Republic. It explores the political, religious, social and military changes through the period. The depth study will explore the relationship of Anthony and Cleopatra and how Rome dealt with Egypt in a period of crisis for the Roman Republic.

Throughout the course, you will be examining continuity, change, cause and consequence, significance and a range of skills to analyse both literary and archaeological evidence.

Assessment:

The Course:

Catering and Hospitality offers a unique opportunity in the curriculum for students to develop their knowledge and extend their range of skills both practically and theoretically.

Students are given the opportunity to work individually and with their peers and apply knowledge from other subjects such as Maths, English, Science, PE and the Arts.

Learners will gain an overview of the Hospitality and Catering industry and the types of job roles that may be available to assist them in making choices about progression. It will also equip learners with the knowledge, understanding and skills required to cook and prepare food. In addition the course encourages students to apply the principles of nutrition, sustainability and healthy eating.

Following this qualification, it will encourage learners to cook and enable them to make informed decisions about food, nutrition and budgeting to allow them to be able to feed themselves and others affordably and nutritiously, now and in later life. It will also allow students to explore sustainability issues related to food issues, including seasonality, food miles and availability, fair-trade and freedom foods.

Hospitality and Catering is a starting point for many career options and is a good foundation for further education courses with nutrition and diet, food safety, quality control, product development, food science and catering.

Assessment:

Unit 1: The Hospitality and Catering Industry. 40% of the overall qualification. Written examination 90 minutes.

Unit 2: Hospitality and Catering in action. 60% of the overall qualification. You will be asked to research, cook and present dishes. This includes a formal practical assessment.

The Course:

Each course is structured under three broad themes, each of which has its own sub-themes:

Theme 1: Identity and Culture - youth culture, lifestyles, customs and traditions.

Theme 2: Wales and the world - home and locality, wider world, sustainability.

Theme 3: Current and future study and employment - studying, enterprise, work and careers.

Assessment:

The assessment of the GCSE courses is made up of four separate units, each assessing different communication skills. Each unit offers foundation and higher tier entries and students may be entered at different tiers for different units depending on ability.

Unit 1: Speaking (25%): Oral test consisting of a role play, a photo card and two conversations.

Unit 2: Listening (25%): Written examination consisting of listening comprehension tasks with non-verbal and written responses.

Unit 3: Reading (25%): A written examination consisting of reading tasks with non-verbal and written responses, including one translation task into English.

Unit 4: Writing (25%): Testing a student's ability to communicate in writing through three tasks (foundation tier) or four tasks (higher tier), including one translation from English to your chosen language.

The Course:

Assessment:

Showcase Unit: The presentation aspect of the unit will give you knowledge and experience of the audition/presentation process.

When selecting an audition piece or preparing a presentation of your work you must develop a suitable vehicle to show your strengths. Therefore, learning how to recognise your specific skills is a crucial step. You must be able to

perform to an audience in this unit.

Devising Unit: This unit is about building your foundations as an actor, musician, dancer or designer; it is not just about performance.

As well as undertaking a programme of practical classes to develop your physical and mental acting skills, you will be

required to demonstrate progress throughout the unit as well as keep a working log of the processes involved.

Presenting Unit: In this unit, you will learn how to develop a performance piece as a member of a performance company. You will take

on a specific performing role and will prepare for, and produce, a performance by carrying out tasks that are

appropriate to your role. No matter what role you undertake, you will also need to explore the performance piece you

are working on.

Photography ()

Course: GCSE

The Course:

Students will develop knowledge, skills and understanding in photography, digital editing in Adobe Photoshop and other techniques through sustained investigation, creativity, experimentation, design and making as a means of developing technical and expressive skills, extending experience and personal response, as well as developing imagination and critical, reflective thinking. The written element of the course will include studying the history of photography, responding to the work of photographers, and evaluating all work reflectively via thorough annotation. Drawing is also an integral part of the course in order to record ideas, plan photo shoots and add to printed images creatively, and this skill will also be developed throughout the course.

Areas of study can include: • Documentary photography • Photo-journalism • Studio photography • Location photography • Experimental imagery • Installation • Moving image: film, video and animation • Digital editing. Assessment:

The course is assessed in two units - coursework and an externally set assignment.

Unit 1: Coursework Portfolio based on themes or a subject you have chosen.

Unit 2: An externally set assignment which will be presented to you as an examination paper. You will be given approximately

six weeks preparation time and 10 hours to complete a piece of focused study.

Physical Education

Course: GCSE

Assessment: 50% Examination

The Course:

You will study health, training and well-being, sports psychology, sports bio mechanics, anatomy and physiology and sociocultural influences on sport.

During lessons, you will also receive practical tuition in developing your three different sports required to gain a grade on the course. Of these, there must be one team sport such as football, netball, rugby and one individual sport such as badminton, athletics or golf. You need to participate regularly in sport activities in your own time individually or for a team, at a competitive level.

You will also complete a performance enhancement programme as part of your coursework, aiming to develop certain areas of fitness relevant to your sport and evaluating your overall fitness levels.

Assessment:

Unit 1: Written examination. Introduction to physical education. You will be assessed through a range of short and extended questions. The questions will be based on audio-visual stimuli and other sources.

Unit 2: Coursework and practical. The active participant in physical education. You will be assessed in three different activities in the role of performer in at least one individual sport, one team sport and one other. One activity will be a major activity which will have a personal fitness programme linked to it.

Product Design D

Course: GCSE

The Course:

Design & Technology Product Design gives you the opportunity to develop your capacity to 'design & make' products that are innovative, meet the needs and wants of a client and to design and develop purposeful products. You will develop a core understanding of the relations between design, materials, manufacturing and marketing. The subject enables you to take a broad view of Design & Technology and to develop a wide range of skills, including working with others, thinking creatively, designing through CAD (Computer-Aided Design) and making quality products.

Assessment:

- Unit 1: Written exam: Design and Technology in the 21st Century. This exam consists of a mixture of short answers, structured and extended writing questions assessing your knowledge and understanding of product design within materials, processes, designers and industry.
- Unit 2: Coursework: Design and Make (35 hours). You will design and make a product based on design briefs set by the exam board. You will be expected to:
 - Identify design possibilities.
 - Develop a design brief and specification.
 - Generate and develop a range of design ideas.
 - Manufacture a product using a mixture of materials and processes.
 - Evaluate the final product.

Religious Education

Course: GCSE

The Course:

You will consider how a broad, deep knowledge of different world faiths and beliefs can help people understand the context of events around the world.

No matter what career path you eventually take, you will work with people. This course encourages and develops skills in decision-making collaboration, independent working and the search for compromise in conflict solutions that work. All these are vital in a modern workforce where communication, collaboration and cooperation are core skills.

As our world becomes increasingly interdependent and diverse, the spirit of enquiry fostered in Religious Studies is ever more relevant, helping you to understand people and to think about the big issues that we all face. This makes it an ideal choice for those looking to work in nursing, teaching, armed forces, lawyers, social work and the police. We also examine issues relating to medical ethics making the course relevant for those pursuing a medical career.

Lessons are taught through a variety of activities such as discussion, research and group work.

Science (Triple Award)

This applies to each science GCSE

The courses:

You will study for three separate qualifications: GCSE Biology, GCSE Chemistry and GCSE Physics. If you choose triple science, then one of your GCSE option blocks will be used to teach you the extra topics to cover the three science GCSEs, in addition to the science taught as a core subject. This course is structured differently from the double award meaning it is not be possible to switch between courses at a later date.

Each unit has two tiered papers: foundation (G-C) and higher (E-A*). Your teacher will advise you which paper would be best suited to your ability.

GCSE Biology:

Learn about the human body, how it works and interacts with the environment. You will learn about animals, plants and their habitats, building an understanding of the delicate balance between species and their environment. Develop your flexible thinking, problem solving and practical skills by applying knowledge of key biological principles.

GCSE Chemistry: Chemistry is the study of substances, their composition, how they interact and what role they play in living things. It is the study of all materials and vital to every aspect of life. Knowledge of chemistry is useful in any sphere of industry but especially the chemical and pharmaceutical industries. It encourages methodical thought, practical ability and problem solving skills.

GCSE Physics:

Physics is the study of "what, why and how", covering a diverse range of subjects ranging from sub-atomic particles to how the universe was formed. The ideas, techniques and skills developed during your GCSE will be invaluable, not only within the field of engineering and medicine but for understanding how things work in everyday life.

College Courses - Limited Availability

Introduction:

There are three potential courses that you may be able to access, depending on interest. These courses will take place at Coleg Llandrillo or Coleg Rhyl. All three courses are double option subjects studied for on a full day in college every week of term. At this stage, ticking the college choice on the option column will just register your interest. It does not guarantee that the course will run.

The Courses:

IMIAL Level 2 in Vehicle Technology

You will be able to learn about all aspects of motor vehicles whilst gaining an understanding of how engines work, maintenance of motor vehicles, basic repair etc. You will have to complete coursework on each topic and there will also be external exams.

WJEC level 1|2 in Construction & Built Environment

On this course, you will develop a range of construction skills both practical and academic through applied learning. This will be transferable in the workplace and for future learning. Knowledge about the construction industry will help you to progress to further study in engineering, construction and project management or to enter the workplace.

Health & Social Care

The WJEC GCSE in Health and Social Care, and Childcare equips learners with knowledge, understanding and skills related to the development and care of individuals throughout the life cycle from conception to later adulthood. Learners have the opportunity to develop their understanding of influences on human growth, development, behaviour and well-being. They will also gain an understanding of the social, physical, emotional, and cultural needs of people who use care and support services, and recognise that each individual has a unique blend of abilities and needs. Learners will gain an understanding of how service provision in Wales supports the development and well-being of individuals, to be able to make informed decisions now and in later life. This specification has been designed to include contemporary issues in relation to the provision of an ethical and sustainable health and social care, and childcare system in Wales, and to create independent learners that can make informed decisions about further learning opportunities or continuing into related career choices. Health and Social Care is offered as a double award at level 1 or 2 in college or as either a single or double award in school, depending on interest. On all courses students will have the opportunity to listen to guest speakers, visit care settings and learn about all aspects of the care sector. The qualification is predominantly course work focussed, with an examined element. It is suitable for students considering careers in nursing, midwifery, care of the elderly, nursery nursing, counselling and play leaders.
